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## **FOREWORD**



The year 2025 will be remembered as a pivotal chapter in the long and renowned history of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA). It was a year that began with a clear vision, gained momentum through collective effort, and culminated in lasting institutional accomplishments. As President of the SLMA, I present this foreword with pride, not as a personal reflection, but as a tribute to a profession that united, disciplined itself, and purposefully responded to the nation's health needs.

At the core of our journey was a unifying vision: "Health Equity Across the Life Course: Resilient Pathways, Empowered Lives." This vision was first articulated through the SLMA Road Map 2025, a strategic blueprint that turned ideals into action. Based on a life-course approach, the Road Map recognised that health outcomes are shaped from early childhood through adolescence, adulthood, and healthy ageing, influenced by social, economic, environmental, and behavioural determinants. It provided clear direction, aligned with national priorities, and offered a shared framework that guided every major initiative undertaken by the Association during the year.

One of the most significant achievements of 2025 was the establishment and realisation of the Sri Lanka Medical Advancement Trust. Designed as a permanent endowment, the Trust signifies a decisive shift from short-term thinking to long-term stewardship. Its purpose is clear: to secure the financial sustainability, institutional independence, and continuity of the SLMA's mission across generations. Through this Trust, the Association has developed a robust mechanism to support ongoing professional development, research, scholarships, leadership growth, innovation, and the preservation of medical heritage. More importantly, it has reinforced trust among members, partners, donors, and the public by integrating principles of transparency, accountability, and sound governance into its operations.

The values expressed in the Road Map found strong expression in visible, people-centred action. The SLMA Health Walk 2025, held as a national advocacy campaign, exemplified the Association's dedication to prevention, wellbeing, and community involvement. More than just a ceremonial occasion, it was a public statement that health promotion starts outside hospital walls through active lifestyles, social engagement, and shared responsibility. The Health Walk united doctors, allied professionals, families, and communities, reinforcing the message that sustainable health depends on collective effort across society to promote the 'Safer Roads-Safer Communities' theme.

Academic excellence remained a core element of the SLMA's identity. The 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress was one of the most comprehensive and intellectually dynamic scientific gatherings in the region. With an extensive programme of pre-congress workshops, plenary sessions, symposia, free papers, and post-congress activities, the Congress showcased the depth and diversity of modern medicine. It offered a platform for innovative science, multidisciplinary dialogue, and the application of evidence into practice, reaffirming the SLMA's position as the leading academic body of the medical profession in Sri Lanka.

Complementing the Congress were the Foundation Sessions of 2025, which reaffirmed the ethical, historical, and professional underpinnings of Sri Lankan medicine. Through speeches, memorial lectures, and thematic discussions, these sessions celebrated not only scientific achievement but also core values of integrity, service, scholarship, and leadership. They acted as a bridge between generations, reminding us that progress in medicine is sustainable when innovation is rooted in tradition and professional ethics.

A major strength of the SLMA in 2025 was its ability to bridge science and policy. The SLMA Health Policy Forum served as an essential platform for evidence-based discussions, bringing together clinicians, academics, policymakers, and stakeholders to tackle urgent health issues at the national level. Through organised discussions and expert insights, the Forum reinforced the SLMA's reputation as a trusted policy partner that advocates based on data, experience, and public interest, rather than ideology. This engagement triggered increased national debate on health equity, system resilience, and preventive measures, and its role in shaping the new health policy was highly esteemed.

Equally impactful was the Association's commitment to inclusivity and decentralisation through Regional and Joint Regional Sessions. By extending academic and professional activities beyond Colombo, the SLMA ensured equitable access to continuing medical education and professional engagement for doctors nationwide. These sessions strengthened regional networks, recognised local challenges, and reinforced the principle that professional excellence must be accessible rather than centralised. They embodied the life-course and equity principles enshrined in the Road Map.

Perhaps the most compelling demonstration of the SLMA's social responsibility in 2025 was its response to the Ditwah Cyclone and subsequent floods. Following this national disaster, the SLMA acted swiftly from concern to action. Through medical helplines, media briefings, fundraising initiatives, intercollegiate coordination, and direct contact with affected hospitals and communities, the Association provided leadership during a period of uncertainty. Its response highlighted the unique role of a professional body in mobilising expertise, credibility, and compassion in service of the public good. It reaffirmed that the social contract between the medical profession and society extends beyond routine care, especially in times of crisis.

Underlying all these achievements was strong governance and collective leadership. Regular Council meetings, active expert committees, intercollegiate collaboration, and dedicated staff ensured coherence, accountability, and continuity. The SLMA functioned not as a collection of isolated activities, but as an integrated organisation guided by shared purpose and disciplined execution.

Reflecting on 2025, a clear story unfolds. This year began with a vision, was driven forward by strategic actions, and ended with establishing institutions. The Road Map provided us with guidance. The Sri Lanka Medical Advancement Trust offered us resilience. Our academic, policy, regional, advocacy, and humanitarian efforts brought that vision to life.

This Annual Report is more than just a record of events. It serves as evidence of what a united profession can accomplish when guided by values, informed by evidence, and committed to equity. It affirms the SLMA's enduring role as the conscience, catalyst, and guardian of medical professionalism in Sri Lanka.

As President of the Sri Lanka Medical Association, I sincerely thank the Council, expert committees, intercollegiate partners, regional collaborators, staff, and members for their steadfast commitment. Together, we have addressed current needs and established solid groundwork for the future.

With trust as our currency, equity as our compass, and service as our calling, the SLMA stands prepared to carry on this journey towards resilient pathways, empowered lives, and a healthier Sri Lanka for future generations.

# **SLMA 2025 ROAD MAP**

In 2025, the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) articulated a clear and forward-looking vision through its Road Map titled "Health Equity Across the Life Course: Resilient Pathways, Empowered Lives." This strategic document reflected the SLMA's commitment to addressing persistent and emerging health challenges in Sri Lanka through equity-focused, evidence-based, and people-centred approaches.


The Road Map adopted a life-course framework, recognizing that health outcomes were shaped by interconnected biological, social, economic, and environmental factors from early life to old age. Strategic interventions were structured around three critical life stages: childhood, adolescence, and adulthood to old age. Special emphasis was placed on early childhood development, acknowledging its long-term impact on health, education, and socioeconomic outcomes. The flagship Pathway to Potential (P2P) initiative targeted children living in poverty

through structured early childhood and after-school programs, individualized nurturing care plans, parental engagement, and multisectoral collaboration aimed at breaking intergenerational cycles of disadvantage.

Adolescent health was identified as a priority investment area with high returns. The Road Map addressed key concerns including sexual and reproductive health, mental well-being, healthy lifestyle practices, and the need for structured transition of care for adolescents with chronic illnesses. The SLMA committed to advocacy and collaboration to strengthen adolescent-friendly health services, education systems, and career guidance, while addressing disparities between urban and rural youth.

A unifying theme across all life stages was wellness, moving beyond the absence of disease toward holistic physical, mental, emotional, and social well-being. In response to the rising burden of non-communicable diseases (NCDs), the Road Map emphasized prevention, early risk reduction, and lifestyle modification, advocating a whole-ofsociety approach that integrated families, schools, communities, and health systems.

The Road Map identified several cross-cutting priority areas with national significance. These included building a climate-resilient health sector, preventing road traffic injuries, addressing neglected tropical diseases such as snake envenoming, and reducing the burden of chronic kidney disease, including CKD of unknown etiology. Initiatives such as the

Climate Smart Green Hospital Initiative demonstrated the SLMA's leadership in promoting sustainability, disaster preparedness, and environmentally responsible healthcare delivery.

To enable sustainable progress, the Road Map aligned with the WHO health system building blocks, emphasizing leadership and governance, financing, human resources, service delivery, health information systems, and access to essential medicines. Importantly, the SLMA proposed the inclusion of "people" as a seventh building block, underscoring community engagement, empowerment, and shared ownership of health outcomes. Strengthening primary health care, advancing clinical governance, promoting lifestyle medicine models, and leveraging digital health and artificial intelligence were identified as key enablers.

Governance, professionalism, and policy influence remained central to the SLMA's mandate. Through the SLMA Health Policy Forum and its network of expert committees, the Association continued to bridge science and policy, advocate for evidence-informed decision-making, and support national health priorities. Capacity building in research, medical writing, editorial standards, and continuous professional development further strengthened the profession and the health system.

Overall, the SLMA 2025 Road Map served as a strategic blueprint guiding the Association's advocacy, partnerships, and initiatives, reaffirming the SLMA's leadership role in promoting health equity, resilience, and sustainable development for the people of Sri Lanka.

# 5. 138TH ANNIVERSARY INTERNATIONAL MEDICAL **CONGRESS**

In the lead-up to the 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress, the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) conducted seven pre-congress workshops from January to June 2025, covering a wide range of contemporary medical topics. The main academic sessions of the Congress were held from 23rd to 26th July 2025 at the Cinnamon Grand Hotel, Colombo, bringing together eminent local and international experts. The academic programme was further enriched by the inclusion of two post-congress workshops. Collectively, these provided rich academic exposure and valuable learning opportunities for both local and foreign delegates.

#### 5.1. PRE-CONGRESS WORKSHOPS

Eight CPD-accredited pre-congress workshops were held covering important subject matter ranging from foundations of clinical research, acute setting management, emergency care, imaging, stoma and wound care, catering to an increasing demand by the medical professionals to expand their skill set and knowledge. Professor Sachith Mettananda and Dr Udana Ratnapala were leading the efforts in organizing the pre congress sessions with the able support of the staff of the SLMA. All these sessions ensured SLMA's vision of contributing towards enhancing Continuous Medical Education in Sri Lanka.

#### 5.2. SLMA CONGRESS 2025

The 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress was held from 23rd - 26th July 2025 at the Cinnamon Grand Hotel, Colombo. The Inauguration ceremony was held on 23rd July 2024 at 6.00 pm onwards. The theme of the Congress was "Health Equity across the Life Course: Resilient Pathways, Empowered Lives". The Chief Guest was Professor Steve Turner, President, Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health, United Kingdom and Guest of Honour was Dr Anil Jasinghe, Secretary, Ministry of Health and Mass Media, Sri Lanka. Dr Dilip P. Bhanushali, President, Indian Medical Association, Dr Asela Gunawardena, Director General of Health Services Ministry of Health, Sri Lanka and Dr J A Jayalal, President, Commonwealth Medical Association were invited as Special Guests.

The annual congress comprised of eight (8) pre congress workshops, the keynote address, four (4) orations, two (02) plenaries, six (06) guest lectures, fourteen (14) symposia, six (06) collaborator sessions, three (03) policy forums, two (02) panel discussions and two (02) quizzes. The parallel "Policy Forum" is a new introduction to the SLMA 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress, where key policy discussions pertaining to the medical fraternity were discussed and the policy briefs were drafted and presented to the Ministry of Health. This highlighted the role of SLMA as a leader in policy.

All were well attended by doctors, researchers and undergraduate and postgraduate students and allied health professionals, from both Sri Lanka and abroad. UN agencies including the WHO, WFP, UNDP and UNICEF organized collaborative symposia with the SLMA during the sessions. Faculty from several foreign universities and research organizations, partnered with the SLMA for several symposia and workshops. Professor Sachith Mettananda was the Chairperson of the Congress. A Conference Steering Committee supported by several subcommittees covering all necessary technical, logistics and coordination sectors, ensured the smooth operationalization of the programme.

There were 248 poster presentations and 30 oral presentations. The abstracts were published as a supplement of the Ceylon Medical Journal.

#### 17.3. ACTIVITIES CARRIED OUT DURING 2025

1. SLCTR Workshops on Promoting Interventional Research in Sri Lanka.

SLCTR in collaboration with the Research Committee of the Faculty of Medical Sciences, University of Sri Jayewardenepura, conducted a workshop on the 20th June 2025 from 9.00 a.m. to 2.00 p.m. This workshop was conducted by the SLCTR committee and focused on providing hands-on training in preparing clinical trial proposals and registering trials. - At the 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress of the Sri Lanka Medical Association, an international symposium was hosted by SLCTR on the topic, "Interventional research". This event was held on 24th July 2025 from 11.15 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. at the Cinnamon Grand, Colombo. Dr Luiza Silva, representing the Brazilian Clinical Trials Registry, served as the main resource person and delivered a session on the Importance of Interventional Research. She was joined by Senior Professor Asita de Silva, Professor of Pharmacology, University of Kelaniya; Professor Pryinaga Ranasinghe, Professor of Pharmacology, University of Colombo; and Dr Ashwini de Abrew, Administrator of SLCTR, who delivered sessions on Why Conduct Interventional Research, Barriers to Conducting Interventional Research, and Clinical Trial Registration, respectively. The symposium was highly engaging, with the participation of more than 70 attendees. Following the event, a satellite meeting was held between Dr Luiza Silva, the SLCTR administration, and regulatory stakeholders from the NMRA to exchange experiences and to discuss improvements to clinical trial registration processes.
- 3. Forty three clinical trials were registered as of 28th November 2025. (Total 534 trials in the registry).
- Total of 67 applications received and processed as of 28th November 2025.
- Several routine maintenance activities were carried out on the SLCTR database and website to enhance user experience.

# **17.4. ACTION PLAN FOR 2026**

- Revamp the SLCTR web application in order to align with the high technical standards stipulated by the WHO-ICTRP.
- 2. Provide a platform for results reporting of trials registered with the SLCTR.
- 3. Repeat the audit on the quality of clinical trials registration at the SLCTR.
- Engage with other regulatory stakeholders in order to minimize delays and duplications that occur during conduct of clinical trials in Sri Lanka.
- Continue education and awareness programmes on interventional research.

# Activities in the year 2025

# Symposium on Digital Transformation in Healthcare - ICARC

A symposium titled "Digital Transformation in Healthcare" was successfully conducted on 19 February 2025 as part of the 5th International Conference on Advanced Research in Computing (ICARC 2025) held by the Faculty of Computing, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The session was delivered in hybrid mode and was organized to highlight the evolving role of artificial intelligence in clinical practice and medical education.

Presentations were delivered by members of the SLMA AI Expert Committee on Artificial Intelligence, including Dr Kumara Mendis, Dr B.J.C. Perera, and Dr Vindya Perera. Key aspects of Al integration into clinical decision-making, AI in medical education, and the ethical responsibilities associated with AI adoption in healthcare were addressed.

The session was well attended, with 82 participants.

# Interdisciplinary Session on Artificial Intelligence in Healthcare - ICCMM 2025

An interdisciplinary session on Artificial Intelligence in Healthcare was held on 4 March 2025 from 1pm to 4pm at the Students' Service Centre Auditorium, Faculty of Science, University of Colombo. The event was organized by the Centre for Mathematical Modelling in collaboration with the SLMA Expert Committee on AI in Medicine.

Plenary lectures were delivered by Dr U.P. Liyanage (University of Colombo) and Dr Kumara Mendis (Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka). The panel discussion featured Dr B.J.C. Perera (Moderator), Professor Athula Sureshchandra, Dr Harsha Jayawardena, Dr Tharanga Samarasekara, and Mr. Rangana Samarasinghe.

The session was well attended and fostered strong interdisciplinary engagement across mathematics, medicine, and health informatics.

# Artificial Intelligence Workshop - SLMA Foundation Sessions

The Artificial Intelligence Workshop was held on 7 November 2025 at Hotel Galadari, Colombo, during the SLMA Foundation Sessions. The programme introduced participants to practical applications of AI in healthcare through a series of short, hands-on sessions.

Topics covered included an introduction to AI in medicine (Dr Prabath Liyanage), large language models such as ChatGPT (Dr Kumara Mendis), Al tools for research and medical education (Dr Vindya Perera), and Al tools for day-to-day clinical tasks (Dr B.J.C. Perera).

The workshop concluded with a feedback session and was well received, with active engagement from all 71 participants. Many attendees requested an extended-duration hands-on workshop in future sessions.

During the period under review, the Expert Committee on Ethics of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) demonstrated strong leadership in advancing ethical governance, patient safety, and professional integrity within the health sector. The year was characterised by a clear shift from discussion to system-wide action, aligning ethics with national policy, institutional practices, and public accountability.

A key milestone was the successful establishment of the National Health Ethics Council under the Ministry of Health. Building on preparatory work begun earlier, the SLMA Ethics Committee drafted the Terms of Reference and Standard Operating Procedures, which were formally approved at the inaugural Council meeting chaired by the Director General of Health Services. The Council is now expected to meet regularly, with a clear plan for legislative recognition through a future Act of Parliament, firmly integrating ethics into national health governance.

Parallel efforts focused on institutionalising Hospital Health Ethics Committees. Engagements were initiated with leading tertiary hospitals, including NHSL, LRH, DMH, and CSHW, with plans to expand to additional centres. These efforts aimed to translate ethical principles into everyday clinical decision-making through structured committees supported by national policy.

The Committee addressed several complex ethical and legal challenges, particularly concerning end-of-life decision-making and withdrawal of life support. Gaps identified in current national guidance led to plans for additional publications and interdisciplinary dialogue, including collaboration with the legal profession, to ensure compassionate and legally sound care pathways.

Advocacy for professional ethics and regulation was bolstered through engagement with the Sri Lanka Medical Council on inappropriate advertising and unethical practices, especially in the private and cosmetology sectors, emphasising the need for updated regulatory guidance.

A significant milestone was the development of the Charter of Patients' Safety and Wellbeing, which evolved from SLMA advocacy to Cabinet approval and progressing to legislative drafting, reaffirming SLMA's historic role in defending patients' rights.

Capacity building continued to be a central focus, with successful workshops for hospital ethics committee members and initiatives to enhance bioethics' visibility through regional meetings, media engagement, publications, and plans for a dedicated ethics book. Collectively, these activities demonstrate a year of purposeful leadership, reaffirming ethics as a fundamental element of a safe, equitable, and trustworthy health system in Sri Lanka.

# **Activities**

# 1. Accreditation system for Sri Lanka

Over the past few years, the FRECSL Management Committee had deliberations to develop a structured and credible review system for the accreditation of Sri Lankan Research Ethics Committees (RECs). The recent economic crisis underscored the importance of having a robust and transparent mechanism to evaluate REC performance, ensuring quality and trust. In response, a dedicated subcommittee was appointed to design a comprehensive accreditation framework, with a particular focus on establishing benchmarks and creating practical

The members appointed to this initiative were Prof. Chandanie Wanigatunge, Prof. Shamini Prathapan, Dr Janaka Pushpakumara, Dr Prasad Ranatunga, Prof. H. Harshini Peiris, and Dr Chaturika Dandeniya. Dr Prasad Ranatunga and Prof. H. Harshini Peiris served as the Chairperson and Convenor, respectively, providing leadership to the process. The committee worked diligently over the last few years to develop a framework.

Guided by the WHO framework, the committee adapted five of the seven recommended categories to suit the Sri Lankan context. In addition, to ensure the completeness of the review process, 3 additional FRECSL criteria were developed. In keeping with environmental policies, the entire review process is being conducted in a paperless

The first accreditation visit was carried out for the SLMA REC from 18th to 20th June 2025. Prior to the visit, a surveyor training was conducted on 17th June 2025. The training was facilitated by Professor Chandanie Wanigatunge, Professor Shamini Prathapan, Dr Janaka Pushpakumara, Dr Prasad Ranatunga, Professor Rasika Perera, and Dr Wasanthi Subasinghe, and was attended by more than 50 participants.

The FERCSL coordinator for this review process was Dr Janaka Pushpakumara, the lead surveyor was Dr Prasad Ranatunga and the second and third surveyors were Professor Shamini Prathapan and Dr Wasanthi Subasinghe.

The second accreditation process was conducted for the BMARI from the 21st to the 24th of October 2025. The training programme for the assistant surveyors was held on the 21st of October. Professor Chandanie Wanigatunge, Dr Janaka Pushpakumara and Dr Prasad Ranatunga were the resource persons for this training. The FRECSL coordinator was Professor Chandanie Wanigatunge with Dr Sajith Edirisinghe as the lead surveyor and Professor Ajith Nagahawatha and Dr Prasad Ranatunga as the second and third surveyors.

The final reports of both surveys were sent to the respective REC for their comments, observations and action plan to rectify the issues identified.

The final report from each accreditation cycle was systematically reviewed by the FRECSL subcommittee. Any new actions were incorporated into subsequent processes, ensuring that the accreditation system remains dynamic, responsive, and aligned with WHO benchmark on best practices and FRECSL criteria for a comprehensive ethics review of protocols.

# 2. Database of reviewers and trainees

A database is being maintained by the FRECSL on all national reviewers and trainees. This database will help select reviewers for the accreditation process for Sri Lankan ERCs. This will also help FRECSL to keep track of trainees, who will be eligible as reviewers.

The Media Committee of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) played a pivotal role during the year in strengthening the Association's public voice, enhancing credibility, and ensuring timely, accurate, and responsible communication on matters of national health importance. In an era marked by rapid information flow and heightened public scrutiny, the Committee functioned as a trusted interface between the medical profession, policymakers, the media, and the public.

Throughout the year, the Committee proactively engaged with print, electronic, and digital media platforms to communicate evidence-based positions on priority health issues. These included non-communicable disease prevention, maternal and child health, disaster response and humanitarian health needs, patient safety, ethics, wellness, and emerging public health concerns. Media statements, press briefings, expert interviews, and



opinion pieces were carefully curated to reflect SLMA's values of professionalism, scientific integrity, and public accountability.

A key focus was combating misinformation and promoting health literacy. The Committee facilitated the availability of subject experts for media engagement, ensuring that complex health issues were explained clearly, responsibly, and in a culturally sensitive manner. Close collaboration with SLMA expert committees enabled rapid, coordinated responses to unfolding health events and policy debates.

The Media Committee also supported key SLMA initiatives and events, such as the Annual Scientific Congress, Foundation Sessions, regional activities, policy forums, and national advocacy campaigns, by increasing visibility and public engagement. Internal communication was enhanced through contributions to SLMA newsletters, digital platforms, and official announcements.

A virtual committee meeting was held via Zoom, during which it was unanimously agreed to establish the Health Journalism Awards in all three national languages—Sinhala, Tamil, and English—across the categories of Print Media, Digital/Online Media, and Electronic Media. A total of 32 applications were received and assessed through an impartial and transparent process. The winners were formally recognised and awarded at the Inauguration Ceremony of the SLMA Foundation Sessions, emphasising the Association's dedication to promoting responsible and high-quality health journalism in Sri Lanka.

Overall, the Media Committee significantly enhanced SLMA's role as a credible national authority on health, reinforcing public trust, supporting evidence-informed decision-making, and positioning the Association as a leading voice for health, equity, and wellbeing in Sri Lanka.

# **Background and Scope**

The Expert Subcommittee on Non-Communicable Diseases (NCD) has been active and operational since 2004. It has given leadership to the SLMA by playing a pioneering advocacy role in the field of NCDs, specifically in providing advocacy for policy formulation, strategic planning, and the development of national action plans. These efforts are conducted in support of the Ministry of Health (MoH) and other relevant ministries and stakeholders.

The committee has successfully impacted the core NCD issues in Sri Lanka: Nutrition, Physical Activity, Tobacco/ Alcohol control, and Prevention (from primary to quaternary levels). The committee manages the SLMA flagship project "Nirogi Lanka," which spawned community empowerment initiatives for healthy lifestyles, the "Nirogi" brand of footwear for diabetics, and the Good Manufacturing Practices of coconut oil.

# **Key Activities and Achievements**

## 1. Nutrition Promotion

# 1. "No Added Sugar" Yogurt Project

- Initiated in 2019 and previously disrupted due to COVID-19 and the economic crisis, this project promoting no-added-sugar yogurt for kids was successfully launched and long term plan to sustain the project was developed.
- A combined webinar and media conference was held with 30 physical participants and over 60 online participants.
- Participants included major stakeholders: The Ministry of Health, professional associations/Colleges, representatives of yogurt producers, and the public.

# 2. Promoting Healthy Eating

- The concept of "Healthy life through healthy eating" was launched to address gaps in awareness regarding the consequences of unhealthy eating, the unavailability of palatable healthy food options, and portion control.
- · This initiative targets healthcare professionals and the general public at all educational levels.

## "Healthy Food" Logo (Ongoing)

- An assessment tool is being developed to address the need for promoting healthy eating and concerns regarding Good Manufacturing Practices (GMPs) and the contents of processed food.
- The project is currently at the stage of developing assessment criteria with multiple relevant stakeholders.

# 2. Physical Activity

# 1. Nirogi Diviya

- · As part of the flagship "Nirogi project," this program promotes physical activities in urban and semiurban communities by empowering them through their inborn leaders.
- The program, which has inherent sustainability, was restarted with online health promotion . The Center for Sport and Exercise Medicine Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo was collaborated.
- The Nirogi website was incorporated into the SLMA website.

# **Addressing Obesity Among University Students**

- · The project is planned to liaise with the NCD unit MOH to finalize guidelines on exercises for schools and universities.
- Future plans include collaborating with the NCD unit MOH, UGC, Ministry of Higher Education, and media to promote these guidelines.
- The committee aims to identify university students with obesity and create multidisciplinary support groups to assist them.

# 3. Advocacy on Physical Exercise Promotion

- The committee has been a major advocate for physical activity promotion programs and member of the steering committee on Physical activity of the MoH, Sport and Exercise Forum SLMA and other relevant organizations.
- Experts have worked closely with the Sports Ministry and international organizations throughout the year.

# 3. Tobacco and Alcohol

1. Banning Single Cigarette Sales



- Recognizing single cigarette sales as a major obstacle to preventing cigarette-related NCDs, the committee has been advocating for a ban for several years.
- Current proposals are with the Ministry, and the committee is in constant discussion with the National Authority on Tobacco and Alcohol (NATA) and the Ministry regarding this issue.

# 4. NCD Prevention

## 1. Management of Dyslipidemia

- Addressed the lack of knowledge among Healthcare Workers (HCWs) and the public through a webinar and press conference held in late November.
- The event saw the participation of more than 70 attendees including the public. Resource persons
  from main clinical colleges provided latest management methods and investigations were discussed
  at length.

# 2. Diabetic Foot Care and Amputation Prevention

- The gap in awareness regarding diabetic foot disease, foot care, and footwear was addressed through a multilayered strategic approach targeting healthcare professionals and the general public.
- Activities included a webinar and press conference to increase awareness, followed by a session demonstrating practical foot care and footwear tips.
- This initiative involved multiple stakeholders, including the Ministry of Health, professional colleges, and the public, and serves as a continuation of the "Nirogi Paada" component of the flagship "Nirogi" project.
- The official launch of the "Paa saviya" Limb salvage clinic' at Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo, associated with the "Nirogi Paada" component of the "Nirogi Project" SLMA.

# 3. Salt Awareness National Campaign: "Less Salt, Less Harm"

- Despite existing guidelines for salt restriction in controlling Hypertension and CKD, adherence among healthcare professionals and the public has been low.
- The "Less Salt, Less Harm" concept was launched at a webinar and media conference involving key stakeholders.
- Five public webinars were conducted, resulting in multiple media reports and publications delivering key messages.

## 1. Second Edition of the Practice Guidelines in End-of-Life Care

The Practice Guidelines in End-of-Life Care, originally published by the Palliative & End-of- life Care Task Force (PCTF) in 2021, was updated and submitted to the Directorate of Non- Communicable Diseases of the Ministry of Health. This updated edition incorporates expert input and recommendations obtained during a stakeholder consultation involving key authorities and subject-matter specialists. The revised document was subsequently forwarded to the Legal Department of the Ministry of Health for further review and recommendations.

#### 2. Webinar Series

The Task Force initiated a series of lunchtime webinars to enhance continuous professional development and awareness. These sessions provided a platform for healthcare professionals to learn from expert speakers, explore critical issues in palliative care, and participate in interactive discussions and Q&A sessions.

## Job Description for the MD Palliative Medicine Specialist

The PCTF was also assigned the responsibility of developing the Job Description for the MD Palliative Medicine Specialist, in preparation for the commencement of MD training. This task was completed, and the draft job description was formally submitted to the National Steering Committee of the Ministry of Health.

# 4. Policy Advocacy

The Task Force actively contributed to the development of national policies for palliative care for the period 2023-2025, and supported the updating of the National Strategic Framework on Palliative Care Development (2025-2030) in Sri Lanka.

## PREVENTION OF ROAD TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

#### Introduction

During the 2024–2025 year, the Prevention of Road Traffic Accidents (PRTC) Committee of the Sri Lanka Medical Association continued its mandate to address the growing burden of road traffic injuries in Sri Lanka through advocacy, policy engagement, and public awareness initiatives. Road traffic accidents remain a leading cause of preventable death and disability in the country, necessitating sustained and coordinated action across the health sector, law enforcement agencies, policymakers, and the wider community. The committee's work during this period focused on strengthening evidence-based interventions, promoting safer road environments, and reinforcing the safety of both the public and healthcare workers.

# **Key Activities and Events**

## 1. Media Briefing on Road Traffic Accident Prevention

The PRTC Committee organized a media briefing titled "Prevention of Road Traffic Accidents and Safer Sri Lanka: A Call to Action" at the SLMA Auditorium. This event brought together senior representatives of the Sri Lanka Medical Association and the Sri Lanka Police to engage with the national media on the urgent need to address road traffic injuries in Sri Lanka. The briefing highlighted the public health impact of road traffic accidents, the importance of stringent law enforcement, and the need for collective responsibility and coordinated national action to reduce preventable injuries and deaths on the roads. The engagement generated public attention and contributed to informed national discourse on road safety.



# High-Level Meeting with the Inspector General of Police (IGP)

The committee held an official meeting with the Acting Inspector General of Police at Police Headquarters, Colombo.

Key discussion areas included:

- Road safety and prevention of road traffic collisions
- Alcohol- and drug-related risks contributing to road traffic injuries
- Safety and protection of healthcare workers, particularly those exposed to occupational hazards during emergency response and roadside care



This engagement strengthened collaboration between the medical profession and law enforcement authorities, emphasizing the importance of joint responsibility in improving road safety outcomes and protecting frontline healthcare workers.

# **SLMA Road Safety Awareness Health Walk 2025**

The SLMA Road Safety Awareness Health Walk 2025 was one of the major public advocacy activities organized by the PRTC Committee during the reporting period. The event commenced at Galle Face Green and concluded at Viharamahadevi Park. Participation included members of the Sri Lanka Medical Association, representatives from the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Transport, Tri Forces, Sri Lanka Police, professional colleges, and the broader medical, nursing, and sports fraternity. The walk served as a strong public advocacy platform to promote safer road practices, policy reform, strengthened law enforcement, and increased community awareness to address the road traffic accident crisis in Sri Lanka. The campaign message, "Think and Drive, Stay Alive," reinforced the importance of responsible road use.







# 4. Policy Forum on Road Traffic Injury Prevention

As part of the 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress of the Sri Lanka Medical Association, the Prevention of Road Traffic Accidents (PRTC) Committee organized a Policy Forum titled "Safe Roads - Safe Communities: Advancing Evidence-Based Action for Road Traffic Injury Prevention." The forum was held on 26th July 2025 from 8.15 a.m. to 10.00 a.m. at Hall C, Cinnamon Grand Hotel, Colombo. This forum brought together medical professionals, researchers, policymakers, law enforcement representatives, and public health stakeholders to engage in evidence-based dialogue on road traffic injury prevention. Discussions focused on strengthening national strategies to reduce road traffic injuries, translating research evidence into effective policy and enforcement mechanisms, and recognizing road traffic injury prevention as a critical public health priority. The forum provided a valuable platform for informed discussion aimed at shaping policy-level interventions with measurable national impact.

## **Impact and Outcomes**

Through the initiatives undertaken during the reporting period, the Prevention of Road Traffic Accidents (PRTC) Committee strengthened inter-sectoral collaboration between the health sector and law enforcement authorities, contributing to a more coordinated approach to road safety and injury prevention. These activities helped elevate national discourse on road safety by engaging policymakers, professionals, and the wider public, while also enhancing public awareness through strategic media engagement and large-scale community participation. Furthermore, the committee's work contributed to policy-oriented discussions grounded in scientific evidence and public health principles, supporting informed decision-making aimed at reducing the burden of road traffic injuries in Sri Lanka.

Publications:


The booklet Snakebite: Prevention and First Aid has been updated and is now available in all three national languages through the SLMA website.

# **Programme for 2026**

- 1. Promote collaborative research on snakebites.
- Conduct educational programmes on snakes and snakebite management for healthcare professionals.
- Initiate an e-library of historical snakebite-related publications currently not available online.
- Conduct awareness programmes for medical officers on the revised ICD-10 subclassification of snakebites.
- Lobby the Ministry of Health to:
  - 1. Declare snakebite deaths reportable and establish a mechanism to investigate such deaths.
  - 2. Make snakebite a notifiable disease and develop a system to report snakebite epidemiology.

This data will help improve strategies to reduce snakebite morbidity and mortality.

# Formulation of National Policies and Laws and Interventions

# 1. Tobacco-Free Generation Policy

This year the Committee initiated advocating for a generational ban on tobacco sales. This concept has received acceptance from the Minister of Health following a meeting with the Committee.

Subsequently, the Committee drafted a Cabinet Paper with its Sinhala and Tamil translations on the request of the Ministry of Health and the National Authority on Tobacco and Alcohol (NATA), detailing the required legal amendments, including translations in Sinhala and Tamil.

A draft endorsement statement intended for circulation among SLMA colleges and associations has been prepared, with plans for formal distribution through the SLMA President. Additionally, informal outreach to other professional bodies has commenced to build broader consensus.

The Committee is currently focusing on developing strategies to expand support for this initiative beyond the medical community.

#### 2. Supporting National Authority on Tobacco and Alcohol (NATA) to amend the NATA Act 2006

The committee played a key role several years ago in drafting amendments to this Act in collaboration with NATA. This year, the committee enhanced its engagement with NATA to expedite the finalization of the amendments, which have experienced significant delays over the past several years.

The committee formally met with the current Chairperson of NATA to discuss the matter, and also directly communicated concerns regarding the delay to the Minister of Health during a meeting the Committee had at the Ministry of Health. Subsequently, the ministry requested the support of SLMA in assisting with the finalization of the draft amendments.

The committee continues to provide technical assistance to NATA in finalizing the amendment text. These amendments include revisions to the Act's definitions to incorporate electronic nicotine delivery devices, regulation of social media promotions, initiation of plain packaging requirements for tobacco products, and a ban on the sale of single sticks of tobacco.

# 3. Smokeless tobacco

It is noted that the prevalence of smokeless tobacco products in Sri Lanka remains at a concerning level. Following representations made to NATA on this issue, the Committee successfully advocated for the establishment of an Expert Committee on Smokeless Tobacco at NATA, comprising seven members from diverse sectors.

The SLMA Expert Committee on Tobaco, Alcohol and Illicit Drugs (ECTA) is represented officially on this Expert Committee, which is actively engaged in several national-level initiatives. An advocacy and training workshop for media personnel on smokeless tobacco was conducted under this committee with the support of the Ministry of Media.

# **Academic Activities**

# Curriculum Framework for Health Medical, Dental, Nursing and Allied Health Education

The Committee completed the finalization of the curriculum framework development initiated by the National Authority on Tobacco and Alcohol (NATA) addressing tobacco use in curricula of medical, dental, nursing, and allied health sciences. This initiative was originally supported by SLMA in response to requests from universities and clinicians for comprehensive tobacco education due to its extensive harms.

After a period of inactivity which was outside the control of SLMA, the Committee reactivated the process in consultation with NATA.



A stakeholder meeting was organized by the Committee and held in March at SLMA, attended by Deans and faculty representatives from approximately 15 medical, dental, and allied health faculties.

The draft report from this consultation was circulated among for review.

Work is ongoing to finalize the curriculum framework and secure endorsement from the University Grants Commission and relevant faculties.

# **National Level Advocacy**

## Opposition to commercial cultivation of cannabis

The Committee formally expressed its strong opposition to the policy permitting private companies to cultivate cannabis for export by submitting a written protest to the President. The letter outlined potential adverse consequences of the policy, including increased risk of domestic misuse, heightened public health harm, weakening of prevention efforts, and normalization of substance use at a cultural level.

The letter's contents received extensive coverage in both print and electronic media, effectively communicating the SLMA's position to a broad audience.

# **SLMA Position on the Nation United anti-drug drive**

The Committee submitted a letter to His Excellency the President of Sri Lanka, commending the "Nation United" initiative. The Committee also provided recommendations to enhance the program's scope and impact.

The primary recommendation emphasized that, for the vision of a drug-free nation to be fully realized, the initiative should centrally incorporate tobacco, alcohol, and cannabis within its prevention, education, and enforcement strategies.

This inclusion would ensure that the national movement comprehensively addresses all harmful substances, thereby delivering sustained health, social, and economic benefits to the people of Sri Lanka. It also requested that the policy allowing commercial cultivation of cannabis to be reversed, not only to prevent the harms it will cause but also to ensure clarity and transparency of government policy in relation to illicit drugs.

## Media advocacy

The Committee established the position of SLMA in different aspects of tobacco, alcohol and illicit drugs at several press conferences with partner organizations during this year giving publicity to the position of SLMA on different aspects of tobacco, alcohol and illicit drug use prevention and control.

# **Technical documents**

The Committee published the Information package on Cannabis for Medical Professionals.

This document provides comprehensive information on cannabis, including its history, usage, health effects, medical applications, cultural perceptions, legal status, economic impact, and promotional campaigns in Sri Lanka. It highlights the health risks of cannabis use, such as addiction, impaired brain development, and mental health issues. While cannabis has limited evidence-based medical uses, its economic potential is debated due to oversupply and financial losses in the industry. The document also discusses global legalization trends and the role of the tobacco industry in promoting cannabis.

The ECSP undertook several important activities in the past year.

A primary, overarching aim of the Committee during the past year has been to translate into action the recommendations for the prevention of suicide in Sri Lanka, published by this Committee and the SLMA last year. To this effect, we held ongoing meetings with relevant stakeholders from the Mental Health Directorate (MHD) and the Non-Communicable Diseases (NCD) Unit of the Ministry of Health (MoH) of Sri Lanka.

A meeting was held with the deputy minister of health to encourage banning reporting on suicides on social media. It was decided to approach the media institution to carry out proper reporting on suicides.

The ECSP collaborated with the Family Health Bureau and the Sri Lanka College of Psychiatrists to analyse and disseminate the findings of psychological post-mortems, and to conduct workshops to disseminate data and plan district-level activities.

# Introduction

The SLMA expert committee on Nutrition, food security and safety continued its work throughout 2025 to advance evidence-based nutrition practice, strengthen national guideline development, and improve awareness of clinical nutrition among healthcare professionals. The committee contributed actively to educational, scientific, and policyrelated initiatives during the year.

# **Activities Conducted in 2025**

# 1. Guideline Development and Review

A major focus of the committee this year was the successful development and finalisation of key national nutrition guidelines, developed collaboratively with the SLMNA and SLCNP:


- Enteral Nutrition (EN) Guidelines: Revised and strengthened recommendations for safe initiation, advancement, monitoring, and prevention of complications in adult and paediatric patients.
- Parenteral Nutrition (PN) Guidelines: Developed updated standards for PN prescription, metabolic monitoring, and catheter-related line care to enhance safety and quality of practice.
- Obesity Management Guidelines: Prepared comprehensive guidance on clinical assessment, dietary and behavioural interventions, pharmacotherapy, bariatric surgery indications, and long-term weight maintenance strategies.

All three guideline documents were completed, finalised, and formally handed over to the SLMA President on 5th of December 2025, marking a major achievement in advancing evidence-based nutrition care in Sri Lanka.









# 2. SLMA Monthly Clinical Meeting – Symposium on Obesity

A key academic highlight was the SLMA Monthly Clinical Meeting on Obesity, held on 16th May 2025 at the SLMA Auditorium. The session brought together endocrinology and clinical nutrition specialists to discuss obesity mechanisms, evidence-based management, practical challenges, and complication prevention. The event promoted knowledge exchange and strengthened multidisciplinary collaboration.

# **Contribution to SLMA Main Congress 2025** - Nutrition Symposium

The committee contributed to the Nutrition Symposium at the SLMA Main Congress 2025, held on 26th July 2025. Key sessions included:

- · Overview of Paediatric Nutrition
- Updates on Elderly Nutrition
- Medical Nutrition Therapy in Chronic Diseases







The symposium provided a platform for sharing evidence-based nutrition knowledge and enhancing clinical practice across paediatric, geriatric, and chronic disease care.

#### **Mission**

To bring experts in their respective fields together under one umbrella with the mission of "Health for All: Accelerate Efforts for Birth Defects Prevention and Care". This mission is aligned with the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) #3 and its aim to ensure Universal Health Coverage - health for all people, everywhere in the country, regardless of their power to pay or speak for themselves.

### **Key Activities Conducted in 2025**

### 1. World Birth Defects Day - Joint Press Conference

The ECBD, in collaboration with the Family Health Bureau and the College of Community Physicians of Sri Lanka, organized a media seminar to commemorate World Birth Defects Day on 3 March 2025. The event provided a platform to emphasize the importance of prevention, early diagnosis, and timely care, while enhancing public awareness on birth defects. Nearly 30 media personnel representing major electronic, print, and social media outlets participated, resulting in extensive media coverage and multiple media outputs generated from the seminar.

#### 2. Launching the Handbook on Birth Defects

ECBD launched the second edition of the Sinhala handbook, "උපත් ආබාධවලින් තෞර නිරෝගී දරු පරපුරක් වෙනුවෙන් අತರ ಜ್ಞಾನ್ನಾತ್" authored by Dr Janithra De Silva, in conjunction with World Birth Defects Day media seminar. The book highlights essential community-level prevention strategies for field healthcare workers. A total of 1,000 copies were printed by the ECBD for nationwide distribution to Public Health Midwives. The publication was formally handed over to Dr Chandima Siritunga, Director of the Family Health Bureau.

### Symposium on Birth Defects at Global Public Health Summit, 2025

The ECBD sponsored and organized a dedicated session titled "Advancing Strategies for Birth Defects Prevention, Diagnosis and Care" at the Global Public Health Summit held on 15 July 2025. The symposium, chaired by Dr Kapila Jayaratne and Dr Susie Perera, underscored the vital role of birth-defects care within the broader agenda



of universal health coverage. Professor Vajira Dissanayake delivered the keynote address, "No UHC Without Birth Defects Care: A Call for Inclusive Health Systems." A panel discussion featuring Dr Dineshani Hettiarachchi, Dr Vindya Subasinghe, and Dr Thushara Priyawansa examined advances in genomic diagnostics, clinical service delivery models, and national capacities for prevention, early detection, and timely intervention.

#### 4. Symposium on Birth Defects, Rare Diseases and Genetics at SLMA Annual Academic Sessions

At the 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress held on 25th July 2025, the ECBD organized a sponsored symposium that provided a multidisciplinary platform to discuss advances in genomic medicine, diagnostic challenges, and emerging priorities in rare diseases.

#### Presentations included:

- Dr Vindya Subasinghe Role of Clinical Geneticists in Sri Lanka
- Dr Dineshani Hettiarachchi Impact of Whole Exome Sequencing on Rare Disease Diagnosis
- Dr Yasas D. Kolambage Skeletal Dysplasia: Diagnosis and Management

The session enriched professional dialogue on strengthening national capacities for rare disease diagnosis and care, reinforcing ECBD's commitment to advancing genomic and precision medicine in Sri Lanka.

#### Planned Activity: Funding a PhD Student for a National Birth Defects Study

In line with strengthening the national birth defects research agenda, the ECBD initiated plans to fund and support a PhD student to undertake a comprehensive national study on birth defects. The proposed work will encompass epidemiological analysis, registry development, assessment of genetic and environmental risk factors, and translation of research findings into effective national prevention strategies. This initiative marks a significant investment in building national research capacity and advancing evidence-based policy for birth defects prevention and care.

#### 18.19. **INTEGRATIVE MEDICINE**

A document justifying the establishment of the Expert Committee on Integrative Medicine was submitted to the 7th February 2025 Council meeting of the SLMA and was approved.

A meeting of the expert committee was held to discuss the objectives of the Committee and the following members participated in the meeting held on 27th June 2025. The members of the committee were drawn from all sectors of traditional medicine (TM), including Sidda, Unanni, Ayurveda and Deshiya Chikitsa representing academia, research institutions, and regulatory bodies and practitioners from all four categories. The allopathic medicine sector was represented by two specialist physicians.

The expert committee met with the director and members of the health policy unit and a dialogue was initiated on integrating TM into the national health policy with the theme "improving well-being". It was discussed in detail with a view to establishing this integration specifically at the primary care level. As a result of this dialogue, it was included as a specific item in the 2026 National health policy for the first time.

The future activities are targeted towards sensitizing mainstream allopathic healthcare providers on TM through a series of symposiums and strengthening the evidence base of TM through conduct of appropriately designed collaborative research studies.



# 19. INTERCOLLEGIATE COMMITTEE

The Intercollegiate Committee was instrumental in identifying key gaps and challenges in the health sector and proposing important changes, modifications and new directions to existing health policies and strategies. This year's committee was further strengthened by active participation of over 40 professional colleges and associations, prioritizing on issues of public health concern.

This year, the Intercollegiate Committee convened meetings on several critical national issues, including the prevention of road traffic accidents, addressing sexual harassment among healthcare workers, and responding to Cyclone Ditwah. These discussions served as an important platform for collaboration, awareness, and policyoriented dialogue. In addressing these matters, the committee worked closely with the government, relevant ministries, and other national officials, fostering effective multi-sectoral cooperation. These discussions underscored the committee's commitment to strengthening the role of future and current medical professionals as leaders in safeguarding public health, promoting professional ethics, and contributing responsibly to national disaster response efforts in Sri Lanka. Through these initiatives, the committee reaffirmed its commitment to empowering medical professionals to act as informed leaders, advocates, and change agents in advancing public health, professional integrity, and national resilience in Sri Lanka.

# 23. PREMISES MANAGEMENT AND DEVELOPMENT

#### Premises, Management and Finance Committee - SLMA (January-December 2025)

From January to November 2025, the Premises, Management and Finance Committee of the Sri Lanka Medical Association served as a key governance body to protect the Association's physical assets, financial stability, and administrative continuity. Chaired by the SLMA President, the Committee met regularly and consistently stressed the importance of institutional stewardship, transparency, and prudent decision-making amid operational, financial, and infrastructural challenges.

#### **Infrastructure and Premises Management**

A key focus of the Committee during the year was the ongoing restoration and upkeep of the SLMA premises, especially tackling recurring roof leaks affecting tenant colleges, washroom facilities, meeting areas, and safetycritical infrastructure. Structural repairs to roofs shared with CCPSL, Haematology, Dermatology, and Radiology units were consistently reviewed, with quotes obtained, contractor performance examined, and decisions postponed where necessary to ensure value for money and technical integrity. The Committee increasingly acknowledged the necessity for professional engineering assessments and long-term maintenance agreements rather than temporary repairs, reflecting a shift from reactive to strategic asset management.

Improvements to functional spaces-including the SLMA meeting room, garage facilities, washrooms, exit signage, and outdoor lighting-were approved with clear timelines and budget limits. Special attention was given to maintaining the architectural character of the SLMA building while enhancing its usability for academic meetings, workshops, and revenue-generating rentals. Safety issues, such as lighting, signage, and access, were regarded as non-negotiable governance responsibilities.

#### **Financial Oversight and Sustainability**

The Committee maintained close oversight of financial flows, including capital expenditure, routine payments, and investment decisions. A consistent policy was to fund major repairs using interest earned on fixed deposits, thereby preserving capital while meeting operational needs. Fixed deposits were reviewed, closed, and re-established when necessary to optimise returns and liquidity. Audit reports, though sometimes delayed, were tabled and discussed honestly, with deficits acknowledged and corrective actions proposed.

The Committee also approved controlled mechanisms such as limited credit card facilities for official online transactions, strictly ring-fenced for administrative use, reinforcing financial discipline and traceability. Expenditure requests were increasingly subject to justification, quotation comparisons, and phased approval, demonstrating a mature approach to fiduciary responsibility.

#### Security, Risk, and Compliance

A key governance concern during the year was premises security. After a security breach that led to unauthorised entry and the theft of printed materials, the Committee took decisive corrective measures, including withholding part of the payments, reviewing contracts, and seeking alternative security providers. These steps highlighted an institutional commitment to accountability and deterrence, even when facing resistance from service providers. Interim extensions to security and janitorial contracts were approved solely to maintain continuity while longer-term solutions were under consideration.

Legal and boundary matters, such as neighbour disputes, tree management, and access rights, were handled through consultation with legal experts, review of deeds, and following proper procedures. The Committee showed caution in decisions with possible legal or reputational effects, strengthening SLMA's reputation as a responsible national institution.

#### **Human Resource and Organisational Development**

Human resource management became a recurring theme, with the Committee recognising the ageing workforce, the need for succession planning, and gaps in administrative resilience. Staff appraisal systems were finalised and implemented, attendance monitoring was strengthened, and recruitment of demonstrators, interns, and IT support personnel was pursued despite operational challenges. Salary increment requests were handled cautiously, balancing staff welfare with financial sustainability and audit guidance.

#### Strategic Initiatives and Institutional Legacy

Beyond routine administration, the Committee supported strategic initiatives with long-term implications, notably the establishment of the SLMA Trust. Legal consultations, governance structures, donor engagement strategies,



and coordination with professional advisors were actively pursued, reflecting a forward-looking vision for financial sustainability and professional development. The publication and sale of biographies of past presidents were regarded not merely as a fundraising activity but as an investment in institutional memory and heritage.

#### Conclusion

In summary, the Premises, Management and Finance Committee in 2025 served as a stabilising and strategic arm of the SLMA, balancing immediate operational needs with long-term institutional goals. Through disciplined governance, transparent financial oversight, and steady leadership, the Committee strengthened the foundations on which SLMA's academic, professional, and policy-oriented work continues. The record of deliberations reflects an organisation aware of its responsibilities as Sri Lanka's leading medical association and dedicated to safeguarding its assets, credibility, and future.

Under the guidance of the Premises, Management and Finance Committee of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA), several renovation, maintenance, and development activities were successfully carried out during 2025 to enhance the functionality, safety, and aesthetic appeal of the SLMA premises.

#### **Structural Repairs and Renovations**

- The main meeting room was fully renovated, including fresh colour washing and the installation of a new airconditioning unit to improve comfort during meetings.
- The auditorium sound system was upgraded, including improvements to the microphone and audio system, to ensure better sound quality and user satisfaction during academic and official events.
- Eco-sol lighting systems were replaced and upgraded in the auditorium, podium, and stage areas, providing an improved appearance and energy-efficient solution.

#### **External Premises Development**

- The rear garage and pedestrian areas of the SLMA premises were developed and landscaped. Previously underutilised areas with tree cover were redesigned to create a more organised, accessible, and visually appealing external environment.
- New roller shutter doors were installed in the garage area, replacing damaged doors. Two electronically operated roller doors were procured and installed from Elcardo, improving security and ease of access.
- Hazardous dry trees located near the SLMA premises were removed in the interest of road safety and public protection.

#### **Electrical and Utility Improvements**

- Electrical wiring and plug points in the Council Room were reorganised and upgraded in accordance with technical and safety standards.
- The pantry cupboard layout was restructured, including partitioning, to ensure secure storage of pantry items and better space management.
- Outdoor illumination across the SLMA premises was enhanced following a proposal by Dr Surantha Perera, with the approval of the Management Committee, to support evening events and improve overall safety.

### **Equipment Procurement**

Camera and Dry Cabinet Purchase - Nikon D7500


As advised by the President and approved through the Premises, Management and Finance Committee, a Nikon D7500 camera with an 18-140 mm lens was procured from Photo Technica (Pvt) Ltd. An Andbon AB-21C Dry Cabinet was also purchased. The package included complimentary accessories (SanDisk Extreme PRO 64 GB memory card and Nikon side bag), along with a 12-month warranty and assured after-sales support. This acquisition will significantly strengthen the SLMA's photography and media capabilities for future events and activities.

#### **Financial and Administrative Developments**

- Plans were initiated to strengthen the SLMA Trust, with an anticipated contribution from 100 donors, each contributing LKR 1 million.
- Arrangements were proposed to introduce a new credit card facility for SLMA through HSBC, Barnes Place branch, under the President's name for a three-year term. The card will have a credit limit of LKR 300,000.00 and will be used exclusively by the Accounts Division for approved online transactions, subject to submission and approval of the application.

Overall, these initiatives reflect the Committee's commitment to maintaining SLMA premises to a high standard while supporting the Association's operational, academic, and financial objectives.

Expenditure for the refurbishment of the premises, routine repairs, and maintenance was Rs.1,474,402/30 Further expenditure for electricity, security, water, telephone, printing, website, and extra expenses Rs. 8,091,734/09. The total expenditure from 01st January to 15th December was Rs. 15,925,708/24.

The CMAAO / SLMA Joint Scholarship, administered by the Tsunami Disaster Fund is the main social responsibility project of the SLMA.

The scholarship was launched in December 2006 for children who lost one or both parents in the Tsunami Disaster of December 2004, by investing the generous donation of US \$ 50,000/- by the Confederation of Medical Associations of Asia and Oceana (CMAAO) and is being continued successfully. As recipients of the scholarships have now completed schooling, these scholarships ended in September 2022.

We have provided educational grants to 6 school children who lost one or both parents as a result of the Easter Sunday bombing at the Zion Church in Batticaloa, in April 2019 The responsibility of selecting the recipients and launching of these educational grants was handed to President SLMA 2019 Dr Anula Wijesundere by Dr Suriyakanthie Amarasekera who was in charge of the project since its inception in 2006.

All these payments have been made using the monthly interest accumulated from the original deposit, leaving the capital intact. It is a privilege and pleasure to be able to extend a helping hand to these young ones who have faced so much tragedy in their lives.


#### Pioneers in Healing: Honouring the Legacy of SLMA Presidents

The Sri Lanka Medical Association proudly launched Volume I of "Pioneers in Healing: The Presidents Who Shaped Sri Lankan Healthcare" this year at the Inauguration Ceremony of the 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress. This landmark publication documents the legacy of SLMA leadership through brief biographies of Presidents across three historical phases: the Ceylon Branch of the British Medical Association (1887–1950), the Ceylon Medical Association (1951–1971), and the Sri Lanka Medical Association from 1972 to the present. The book serves as an important historical record, highlighting the pivotal role played by SLMA Presidents in shaping both the Association and the national healthcare system.

The concept for this publication was initiated by Dr Surantha Perera, President of the SLMA, with the objective of formally recognising the service, advocacy, and leadership of past Presidents. The volume was meticulously compiled and edited by Dr Malik Fernando, a Past President of the SLMA, whose leadership and deep understanding of the Association's history added exceptional value to this work. This publication stands as a tribute to medical leadership and institutional memory. Building on the success of Volume I, Volume II is planned for launch in 2026, continuing the SLMA's commitment to preserving and celebrating its rich professional heritage.









# 29. INNOVATIVE ACTIVITIES OF THE SLMA IN 2025

#### 29.1. PATHWAY TO POTENTIAL - A HEADSTART FOR CHILDREN IN POVERTY

The Pathway to Potential programme aims to break the intergenerational cycle of poverty by providing high-quality, context-responsive early childhood development support for children living in poverty, while empowering families and communities to become self-reliant. Recognising early childhood as a critical window for cognitive, emotional, and social development, the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) initiated this programme to establish quality daycare and early learning settings that address the holistic needs of vulnerable children through individualized nurturing care.

As part of this initiative, the SLMA collaborated with the Women International Foundation, seeks to train and promote women as "Carepreneurs" (Carer + Entrepreneur) - equipping them with the skills, knowledge, and support needed to establish and sustainably operate early childhood development day-care centres within impoverished communities, thereby simultaneously advancing child development, women's economic empowerment, and long-term poverty reduction. Ms. Seroshi Nandasiri the chairperson and the co-founder of Women International Foundation and Ms. Duvindi Illankoon had the initial discussion with the President and the Honorary Secretary of the SLMA.



#### 29.2. WAY FORWARD IN ADOLESCENT CARE

The Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) aims to promote the health and well-being of adolescents by advocating for evidence-based, adolescent-friendly, and multisectoral interventions that address their evolving biopsychosocial needs. Recognising adolescence as a critical life stage, the initiative focuses on strengthening health services, improving transition of care for chronic conditions, promoting healthy lifestyles, supporting mental health, and enhancing adolescent-responsive education and career guidance, in collaboration with key national stakeholders.

As the first step, the SLMA 138th International Medical Congress conducted a parallel symposium on "Unspoken burden of adolescent mental health" which paved the pathway to develop a policy brief that was submitted to the Ministry of Health. The symposium consisted of several interesting topics;

- 1. The silent pandemic: Teen loneliness in a hyperconnected world: A glimpse into the adolescent mental health epidemiology of the region by Dr Dutsadee Juengsiragulwit, Consultant Psychiatrist - Department of Mental Health, Thailand
- Digital detox: Can unplugging improve teen depression and anxiety and prevent suicides? By Dr Darshani Hettiarachchi Consultant Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist - Lady Ridgeway Hospital for Children, Sri
- Autism in the teenage years: Navigating the storm of adolescence by Professor Miyuru Chandradasa Professor in Psychiatry - University of Kelaniya, Sri Lanka
- Overview of child and adolescent mental health services in Sri Lanka by Professor Shreenika Welinage Professor in Community Medicine - University of Colombo, Sri Lanka





#### 29.3. WORKING GROUP ON CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRAMMES IN DENGUE

This webinar was livestreamed to dengue experts, clinicians and public health professionals in South Asia and South East Asia, propagating Sri Lanka's best practices in Dengue Clinical Management, surveillance, prevention and outbreak response.

### 29.4. WELLNESS - A UNIFIED FOCUS FOR SUSTAINABLE HEALTH

Well-being extends beyond the absence of disease and encompasses physical, mental, emotional, and social health across the life course. Despite strong clinical guidelines for non-communicable diseases in Sri Lanka, prevention and lifestyle modification are often addressed only after disease onset, highlighting an unmet need for early health promotion and personal empowerment. Greater emphasis on early childhood, parenting, school education, youth well-being, and healthy ageing is essential. Professional health organizations have a critical role in integrating well-being into person-centred care, advocating for supportive public policies, educating communities, and strengthening multisectoral approaches to promote well-being for all.

In commemoration of the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the Organization of Professional Associations (OPA), the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) launched its pioneering initiative—the Wellness Birthday Card, a national call to transform turning 50 into a milestone of health and renewal. The highlight of the evening was the presentation of the first Wellness Birthday Card to the Hon. Deputy Minister of Health and Mass Media, Dr Hansaka Wijemuni, symbolizing a culture shift toward proactive, preventive healthcare for all Sri Lankans.

Through this initiative, the SLMA reaffirmed its commitment to promoting holistic, preventive, and sustainable healthcare practices aligned with the evolving health needs of Sri Lanka.

Sri Lanka is at a crucial point in its health and development journey, facing increasing burdens of non-communicable diseases, rising mental health issues, quick lifestyle changes, and a gradually ageing population. Recognising that these linked challenges cannot be tackled through curative care alone, the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) has begun a major shift towards a wellness- and prevention-focused approach by establishing the SLMA National Wellness Forum.

The Forum is designed as a strategic, unified, multi-stakeholder platform dedicated to promoting holistic wellbeing throughout the life course. Its main goal is to enhance physical, mental, social, emotional, environmental, and digital health, while fostering preventive care, encouraging healthy behaviours, and building resilient individuals and communities across the nation. The overall vision is clear and inspiring: a healthier Sri Lanka where every citizen is empowered to thrive throughout their life.

To realise this vision, the Forum is guided by clearly defined strategic objectives. These include advocating for evidence-based wellness policies, encouraging collaboration across sectors such as health, education, labour, transport, environment, sport, media, and social development, enhancing capacity among professionals and communities, developing and sharing best practices, and rallying communities for prevention, resilience, and healthier lifestyles. The scope of work covers wellness throughout childhood, adolescence, adulthood, and older age, with particular focus on NCD prevention, mental wellbeing, nutrition and physical activity, workplace wellbeing, healthy ageing, and emerging areas like digital and environmental wellness.

Operationally, the Forum is designed for sustainability and impact. It is chaired by Dr Surantha Perera, President of the SLMA and supported by an Executive Committee consisting of senior SLMA leaders and partner institutions, technical working groups aligned with thematic priorities, and a wide partner network that includes academia,

professional colleges, ministries, UN agencies, civil society, and representatives of youth and older persons. Core activities include an annual National Wellness Summit, quarterly thematic forums, expert roundtables and policy dialogues, community engagement initiatives, professional capacity-building programmes, and regular publications and knowledge briefs. Expected outputs range from an annual 'State of National Wellness Report' and a national wellness roadmap to evidence briefs, community mobilisation programmes, and findings from a National Wellness Pulse Survey.

The official launch of the SLMA Wellness Forum on 8 December 2025 marked a significant milestone in Sri Lanka's preventive health journey. The event brought together clinicians, public health experts, academics, policymakers, allied-sector representatives, and emerging health leaders, reflecting the Forum's foundational belief that sustainable wellness demands collaboration beyond the health sector alone. In his address, the Chair, Dr Surantha Perera, emphasised that wellness extends far beyond the absence of disease, underscoring the need to embed prevention, resilience, and healthy behaviours into national systems and everyday life. The Secretary, Dr Arunie Malwatta, outlined the Forum's operational framework, highlighting strong alignment with Lifestyle Medicine principles, including nutrition, physical activity, mental well-being, sleep, stress management, social connection, and avoidance of harmful behaviours.

Collectively, the SLMA National Wellness Forum embodies a forward-looking, evidence-based commitment to transforming Sri Lanka's health landscape—enhancing prevention, shaping policy, mobilising communities, and building a resilient, equitable, and wellness-focused health system for the future.

#### 29.6. SLMA POLICY FORUM

The SLMA Health Policy Forum was established as a structured platform to bridge scientific evidence and public policy, with the overarching goal of addressing national health challenges through clear, actionable policy briefs that inform decision-making and drive meaningful change. Led by the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA), the Forum seeks to identify and prioritise key health-related policy issues, generate and synthesise relevant evidence, foster multi-stakeholder engagement, and advocate for policy reforms through sustained follow-up. By creating a formal space for dialogue between health professionals, policymakers, and other sectors, the Forum aims to strengthen evidence-informed health policy development in Sri Lanka.

During the year 2025, two successful policy forums were conducted in the months of February and March, which was followed by a parallel policy tract in the 138th anniversary international medical congress, which covered a few more important health policy dialogues. The Policy advocacy briefs are annexed. (Annexure 13)

The policy forum in February focussed on "Financing aged care in Sri Lanka".













The second policy forum held in March focussed on "Safety in Health Care Settings"





In addition, the following policy dialogues were carried out in the 138th Anniversary International Medical Congress.





#### 29.7. REACH OUT AND READ-ORGANIZATION SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY PROGRAMME

As part of its commitment to early childhood development, the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) launched the Reach Out and Read Programme at the base hospital level, commencing at Panadura. This initiative aims to foster a culture of reading from the earliest stages of life by integrating book distribution and reading encouragement into routine child healthcare services. By promoting early literacy and parent-child interaction, the programme supports cognitive, emotional, and language development, reinforcing the role of healthcare institutions in shaping holistic child well-being. The Reach Out and Read Programme reflects the SLMA's dedication to long-term community empowerment through sustainable, child-centred interventions.



#### 29.8. SLMA WEBSITE REVAMPED

The SLMA Website user interface was redesigned completely, turning it to a standard intuitive user-friendly interface. The Top level menus were restructured. All details were updated, and made compatible to be viewed properly on smartphones and tablets as well. All fonts and accent colours were made consistent throughout the website.

In the back end, the web hosting server, user administrators to WordPress and C-Panel were reorganized. New measures were taken for cyber-security. The payment gateway was further secured and updated. This allowed for foreign payments for SLMA membership subscriptions and for payment of the registration for the annual medical congress, in Sri Lanka Rupees.





#### 29.9. SLMA STRATEGIC COLLABORATION PLATFORM

In 2025, the President and the Council of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) strategically enhanced the Association's visibility beyond the health sector, recognizing that many determinants of health lie outside healthcare services. Engaging with other professional associations such as education, social services, disaster management, environment, and development partners positioned SLMA as a credible, evidence-based voice in national policy dialogue. This increased visibility enabled stronger multisectoral collaboration and more effective advocacy for population health and well-being. It also supported the integration of health considerations into broader development and humanitarian agendas. Overall, this approach strengthened SLMA's leadership role, partnerships, and capacity to respond to emerging national challenges.

#### **Collaboration with OPA**

This initiative highlights the importance of preventive care and healthy ageing. The Wellness Card initiative was led by Dr Susie Perera, Vice President of SLMA, and reflected the Association's continued commitment to promoting wellness through meaningful collaborations that support lifelong health awareness.









Dr Surantha Perera, President of SLMA, received the "Apex Award of Professional Excellence" in the field of health care and medicine for his contributions to his profession and the nation. This award was presented at the 4th National Apex Awards, organized by the Organisation of Professional Associations of Sri Lanka (OPA), on August 19th, 2025, at Cinnamon Life, Colombo.

Following a proposal by the President Dr Surantha Perera and the concurrence of the Council of the SLMA, a trust fund named "Sri Lanka Medical Advancement Trust" is in the process of being developed in association with Messrs. D. L. & F. de Saram, Law Firm.

# The salient features of the Trust

#### Objectives:

The Trust will fund projects and programmes of the Council in office at the time in the following

- CPD programs, research, or SLMA heritage activities
- Provision of scholarships and grants
- Maintaining historic SLMA property/assets
- Supporting public health campaigns in line with SLMA policy

### Funding:



The Trust will receive and manage donations, bequests, and endowments.

The initial target is 100 million rupees.

#### Management:

The Trust will be managed by an independent Board of Trustees, who shall be referred to as the Board of Management of the Trust, to avoid confusion with the Board of Trustees of the SLMA.

#### Current status of the proposal:

A draft trust deed has been drawn up by the law firm. This is being reviewed and revised by a Working Party consisting of Past Presidents, members of the current Council and independent nonmedical professionals, together with the President. A few more consultations will have to be held before all details are resolved.

It is proposed that the final version of the Trust Deed will be presented to the membership at a special general meeting for approval before it is put into action.

# 30. SLMA RESPONSE TO DITWAH CYCLONE

In November, all regions of Sri Lanka were simultaneously devastated by the Ditwah Cyclone, and the heavy floods and landslides that followed. SLMA was quick to step into its pivotal role as an apex medical professional association.

According to the United Nations Resident Coordinator for Sri Lanka, 998,918 people across all 25 districts have been affected and more than 180,000 people from over 51,000 families are sheltering in 1,094 government-run safety centres as of 30th November 2025. The healthcare system of Sri Lanka faced numerous problems. Several government hospitals were flooded, including the Chilaw district general hospital (DGH) and Mahiyanganaya base hospitals, impacting hospital infrastructure and medical equipment and supplies, adding up to billions of rupees in damages.

The Role of SLMA was mainly not during the disaster itself, but in the immediate aftermath. We recognized the increased risk of water-borne and vector borne diseases that frequently cause epidemics post flood, and the impact the floods had on the healthcare system as a whole. With the intervention of the president, several key initiatives were set in motion.

#### **30.1. SLMA HEALTH HELPLINE**

We recognized that the impact of the disaster extended beyond damage to the healthcare system itself, significantly restricting public access to essential healthcare services. Widespread displacement from homes, disruption of transportation networks, and extensive destruction of property resulted in millions of people being unable to seek timely medical care.

In response, and to bridge the widening gap between healthcare providers and the public, the National Health Emergency Helpline was established in partnership with Dialog Axiata PLC. This initiative was designed to ensure continuity of medical advice and support to affected populations during a period of severe disruption.

The helpline recruited specialist medical practitioners from a wide range of disciplines to respond to health-related inquiries from the public, including both individuals directly affected by the disaster and those experiencing secondary impacts. Services were made available in all three national languages - Sinhala, Tamil, and English - ensuring inclusivity and accessibility across communities.

Through the partnership with Dialog Axiata PLC, the helpline was offered entirely free of charge to the public, with no

telephone costs incurred, thereby removing financial barriers to access. With the coordination and support of the Intercollegiate Committee of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA), over 200 specialist doctors volunteered their time and expertise to provide medical advice via telephone, without remuneration.

### **30.2. INTERCOLLEGIATE COMMITTEE MEETINGS**



In the immediate aftermath of the disaster, the Intercollegiate Committee was summoned on 3rd December 2025 for an urgent meeting to define its roles and responsibilities in supporting affected communities. Members were called upon to mobilize volunteers for the SLMA Health Helpline and contribute to other SLMA-led initiatives. Each college presented their ongoing projects, enabling the committee to coordinate efforts effectively and prevent overlap, ensuring efficient use of resources. The meeting was conducted in a hybrid format, allowing participation both inperson and virtually, reflecting the committee's commitment to inclusivity and rapid response.

A second meeting was summoned on 11th December 2025, focusing on further discussions and fundraising initiatives to restore flood-damaged hospitals. This meeting was held entirely virtually, facilitating full participation from members across the country. Both meetings highlighted the committee's proactive approach, collaborative spirit, and dedication to strengthening the national healthcare response in the wake of the disaster.



#### 30.3. SLMA MEDIA CONFERENCE: POST FLOOD HEALTH CONCERNS

In consideration of the unique position SLMA has as the apex professional medical organization, it was decided to utilize the reputation and status of the SLMA and the expertise of the Intercollegiate Committee to raise national awareness regarding post flood health impacts.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> December 2025, a multidisciplinary panel was assembled from members of the intercollegiate committee, with specialities covering key demographics of the Sri Lankan population. News reporters and camera crews from all major TV channels, FM radio stations and newspapers, were present at the SLMA Auditorium.

The expert panel consisted of Dr Surantha Perera (President, SLMA), Professor Pujitha Wickramasinghe (President, Sri Lanka College of Paediatrics), Dr Vindya Kumarapeli (President, College of Community Physicians of Sri Lanka) and Dr Sanath Akmeemana (President, Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists). Dr Surantha Perera and Dr Kumarapeli covered general health concerns, while Dr Akmeemana and Professor Wickramasinghe addressed health concerns relating to women and children, respectively. Media statements were given in both Sinhala and English.

The press conference covered several key aspects:

- 1. Risk of infections such as leptospirosis, Hepatitis A, and typhoid following contact with floodwaters.
- 2. Provision of post-exposure prophylaxis for leptospirosis through the Medical Officer of Health (MOH).
- Increased risk of vector-borne diseases, including dengue, following floods, with an urgent call for strengthened vector-control measures.
- Need for mental health support and counselling for affected communities, with emphasis on awareness of 4. the National Mental Health Helpline (1926).
- Contamination of drinking-water wells and the importance of well-cleaning and water-purification processes after floods, with the assistance of Public Health Inspectors (PHIs).
- Availability of the SLMA Health Helpline: 0777-119-900.
- Restoration of Child Health Development Records (CHDR) and pregnancy records through Public Health Midwives.
- Increased risk of skin infections following flood exposure.
- Importance of maintaining personal hygiene in emergency shelters and relief camps.
- 10. Importance of continuing medications for non-communicable diseases to prevent deterioration of existing conditions, especially as the government healthcare system is already overwhelmed and further impacted by floods.



Another media encounter was arranged as Dr Surantha Perera got the opportunity to represent SLMA in a talk show 'Manushyathwaye Sathkaraya' which held discussions in the theme "Rebuilding Sri Lanka". Here, Dr Surantha was invited to give his perspective on rebuilding Sri Lanka with respect to healthcare, and talk about new and ongoing initiatives of SLMA in response to the Ditwah cyclone.



#### **30.4. SLMA RELIEF FUND**

The cyclone's impact on the health sector is set to take months or even years to recover from. While most humanitarian organizations were focusing on providing basic needs to the impacted population, the health care system was left in the background. The SLMA identified the need for a quick restoration of the health care system as it impacts a much more vulnerable population.

A current account relief fund that was initially established during the COVID-19 epidemic was utilized for this purpose, to collect local and foreign donations to restore hospitals impacted by the floods. After a discussion with the ministry of health, it was decided that we were to focus on two main hospitals that were severely impacted by the floods; Chilaw DGH and Mahiyanganaya Base Hospital.

Flyers were disseminated via Facebook, Whatsapp and the website (slma.lk/slma-relief-fund/), calling for donations. The donation appeal was specifically targeted to Sri Lankan diaspora communities living in first world countries, specially Sri Lankan doctors working in UK, Australia, United States of America, etc.



Furthermore, the SLMA called for doctors and other healthcare workers who were affected by the floods. This is a part of the population that usually gets overlooked. There were reports of healthcare workers who have lost everything themselves, but still, showing up at the hospital to serve the community. It is in the interest of the public, at large, that healthcare workers are looked after as they are a keystone of our society.

#### 30.5. VISIT TO CHILAW DGH

A visit to the District General Hospital (DGH), Chilaw, was arranged to assess and document the extent of the damage. This was essential to set accurate targets and to raise awareness in order to mobilize funds for restoring the hospital to its former level of functionality.

### **Site Observation**

The Director of DGH Chilaw, Dr Sumith Attanayake, arranged a guided walkthrough of the hospital for the SLMA team and the media to highlight the damage, which was necessary for fundraising. Other DGH Chilaw consultants also participated, including Dr Udana Ratnapala, Consultant Nephrologist.

The site visit revealed the on-the-ground reality of the situation. Both the SLMA team and the media documented the conditions through photographs, video footage, and recorded statements from hospital doctors.











The images of flood damages were published in the SLMA Relief Fund web page (slma.lk/slma-relief-fund/) as well as various other media sources.

#### **Disaster Management Discussion**

A brief discussion among the Director - DGH, Cilaw, consultants and SLMA representatives took place, regarding the necessary steps and fund allocations within the hospital. A heartfelt message from the consultant forensic pathologist was a highlight of the discussion. The lack of adequate facilities prior to the floods had worsened the damage, resulting in the destruction of medico-legal documents dating back several decades. This underscored the importance of building a climate-resilient hospital, as such a facility should serve as a place of safety and security in the event of a disaster.





#### **Press Conference at Chilaw DGH**

The Discussion was followed by a press conference in the director's office. The Goal was not only to raise awareness for the fund-raising campaign, but to advocate for a climate resilient hospital in Chilaw and for future hospital projects in Sri Lanka. Dr Surantha Perera addressed the press with director, Dr Sumith Attanayake and Dr Udana Ratnapala at his side.

# SLMA DECLARATION ON THE PREVENTION OF ROAD TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

MARCH 2025

#### **PREAMBLE**

Road traffic accidents (RTAs) represent a national public health crisis in Sri Lanka, with significant human, economic, and social costs. The Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) recognizes the right of every Sri Lankan to safe mobility and the urgent need for a multi-sectoral response. It declares its full commitment to preventing RTAs and calls upon the Government, civil society, and all stakeholders to act decisively.



#### • SLMA 10-POINT AGENDA FOR PREVENTING ROAD TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS

1. Enact a Comprehensive Road Safety Law
Urgently modernize the Motor Traffic Act with strong enforcement mechanisms, regulation of drug and alcohol use while driving, seat belt and helmet laws, and GNSS-based vehicle tracking.

2. Establish a National Road Safety Commission
Upgrade the existing National Council for Road Safety into an independent Commission with legislative power, technical expertise, and adequate funding to coordinate national efforts.

3. Ensure Safe and Roadworthy Vehicles

Mandate compliance with UN safety standards for all imported and used vehicles. Implement mandatory vehicle inspections and enforce garage accreditation systems.

#### 4. Design Safer Roads and Urban Environments

Adopt iRAP 2-star (or higher) road design standards for all national and provincial roads. Integrate road safety into all urban planning and infrastructure projects.

5. Institutionalize Post-Crash Trauma Care
Establish a National Trauma Registry and upgrade regional trauma care facilities. Standardize EMS response with GPS tracking and ensure 24/7 access to trained paramedics and ambulance services.

#### 6. Reform Driver Licensing and Training

Introduce simulator-based training, Learning Management Systems (LMS), and a tiered licensing structure based on vehicle size and risk. Enforce regular medical and skill re-certification.

#### 7. Prioritize Speed Management and Intelligent Transport Systems

Implement speed governors, traffic calming infrastructure, smart traffic signals, and automated enforcement systems, including CCTV and radar-based speed detection.

#### 8. Promote Road Safety Education and Public Awareness

Integrate road safety education into all school curricula.
Partner with media, civil society, and influencers to run continuous campaigns targeting behavioural change.

#### 9. Protect Vulnerable Road Users

Ensure pedestrian walkways, bicycle lanes, safe school zones, and inclusive access for the elderly and disabled in all road projects.

#### 10. Strengthen Data, Research and Accountability

Develop and implement a Sri Lanka Accident Data Management System (SLADMS), promote citizen reporting, and ensure data transparency for policymaking and public accountability.

# • SPECIAL IMPLEMENTATION MECHANISM

#### **Immediate Action:**

Appoint a Presidential Task Force on Road Safety with cross-sectoral representation to:

Oversee the execution of the 10-Point Agenda

- Monitor enforcement and inter-agency coordination Report quarterly to the President and Parliament

#### Long-Term Institutionalization:

Establish a National Transport Safety Commission under statute, with the power to:

Regulate, monitor, and audit all road safety interventions

- Certify infrastructure, vehicles, and training programs
  Serve as the national repository for data and research on RTAs

#### ENDORSEMENT

### **POLICY FRAMEWORK**

Climate Smart Green Hospitals



#### 1. INTRODUCTION

Climate Smart Green Hospital Initiative is built upon global frameworks such as the World Health Organization's Safe Hospital Initiative, where the role of hospitals as critical infrastructure is strengthened and amplified to meet the challenges created by climate change. Although WHO's framework is confined to three critical areas of hospital functionalities like structural, non-structural, and functional safety, the Climate Smart Green Hospital Initiative would step further, adding areas important to sustain climate initiatives within hospitals.

The expected outcome would be to establish processes within Sri Lankan hospitals to convert them as climate-smart hospitals empowered to meet the challenges posed by climate change and subsequent negative impacts. SLMA Expert Committee on Planetary Health and Climate Effects would focus on the following key areas to promote and establish processes for Climate Smart Green Hospitals in Sri Lanka in 2025 and beyond.



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

#### Proposal to Introduce a "Healthy and Low-cost" Alcohol Product

Alcohol kills people who consume alcohol and those who do not. There are no healthy alcohol products. The illegal alcohol trade cannot be countered through price cuts on legal alcohol. These are simple facts on alcohol. It is of concern that the Excise Department, the government agency tasked with dealing with alcohol production and sale is either unaware or have not considered these factors before publicly announcing the introduction of a "healthy" and "lowcost" alcohol product.

It is also of concern that the Excise Department is unaware or not taken into consideration the fact that consumption of alcohol increases when the prices are reduced, especially among the young people and socio-economically disadvantaged groups. Decrease in the price of any product, leading to increase of sales is a basic principle of economics.

We are also concerned that the Excise Department agrees with the unsubstantiated claims of the alcohol industry that illegal alcohol use is widespread in the country. In fact, illegal alcohol use is miniscule in Sri Lanka compared to use of legal alcohol products. This has been shown by the Household Income and Expenditure Survey of the Department of Census and Statistics and other studies in Sri Lanka. If there is a technically sound, independent national study with no direct or indirect involvement of the alcohol industry that confirms the stance of the alcohol industry and the Excise Department, we request you to make it available to the public.

We are all aware that Sri Lanka is also currently grappling with significant economic challenges, including elevated poverty rates and high levels of food insecurity. It has been reported that quarter of the population lives below the poverty line, a situation exacerbated by declining real wages. Introducing lowcost alcohol containers in this context will lead to increased consumption among vulnerable populations who are already struggling to meet their basic needs leading to many negative socio-economic consequences. This is particularly concerning given that many families are already facing financial difficulties, with households taking on debt just to meet food requirements.

As you are aware, alcohol consumption in Sri Lanka poses significant social and economic harms that exacerbate the country's existing challenges. The health system is already under immense strain from non-communicable diseases linked to alcohol, such as liver cirrhosis and cancer. Economically, the burden is staggering, with alcohol-related costs estimated at USD 885.86 million in 2015. This financial strain diverts resources from essential services like healthcare and education, perpetuating cycles of poverty.

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Furthermore, the Excise Department must be well-aware that alcohol use contribute significantly to accidents that kill thousands of Sri Lankans every year, family instability and crime, undermining community cohesion and economic productivity.

The people of Sri Lanka do not deserve this bureaucracy-induced, alcohol industry-friendly and shortsighted policy that will increase the disease burden, accidents, domestic violence, child abuse, suicide, crime and other social consequences.

Illegal alcohol should be combatted through strong, competent, incorruptible enforcement of the law. The role of the Department of Excise in relation to illegal alcohol is clearly stated in the excise Ordinance. We request that the department display its competence by strengthening the enforcement on such products, rather than tacitly acknowledging failure to do by promoting price competition between legal and illegal alcohol which is always won by the illegal alcohol producers.

Therefore, we earnestly request you to reconsider this decision which will also be contrary to the policy of the current government to improve the quality of the lives of all Sri Lankans. Implementing such a policy would only benefit corporate interests of the alcohol trade, to the detriment of all of us, including the officials and the families of the Department of Excise.





### Government approval for cannabis cultivation in Sri Lanka

The Sri Lanka Medical Association, which is the academic body representing all the medical professionals in Sri Lanka, is extremely concerned by the announcement that foreign companies will be allowed to grow cannabis in Sri Lanka. We strongly urge the government to reverse this decision. There are many compelling reasons for this.

- · The term "medicinal use" that has been used when announcing this decision is misleading. Approved use for cannabis and related products, even in countries such as the United Kingdom and the United States is confined to a very few and rare conditions.
- · The quantities of cannabis required to produce such medicines in use and for further research does not necessitate it to be grown in large tracts of land in Sri Lanka, when other countries are currently producing hundreds of tons of this substance for the same purpose. In fact, the amount of cannabis grown for medicinal and pharmaceutical purposes has significantly decreased since 2021, according to the International Narcotic Control Board
- · It is well known that there is a concerted global effort by the cannabis multinationals to expand their markets to offset billion-dollar losses that they have suffered during the past. In countries that they have perceived resistance, their strategy is taking a stepwise approach, which will eventually lead to dismantling restrictions in place over time.
- Allowing cannabis cultivation for "export" should be considered such a "beneficial" sounding initial step, which will unlock their road to success. This decision is therefore the first breach of the dam that protected Sri Lankans from the scourge of widespread use of cannabis.
- Prices of cannabis products have fallen steeply during the last decade in world markets due to over-supply. Predictions of it being a miracle cure for economic issues that poor countries face, that have been made over the years, have been shown to be spurious. Some countries that fell into this trap early, are seeing the "investors" disappearing and the actual inflow of foreign currency being miniscule compared to the estimates.

- If the government is looking for foreign currency inflows, the amount of investment promised through this policy is a few million dollars which mainly consist of one-time inflows. Compared to around 500 million dollars sent to this country each month by expatriate workers, it is a drop in the ocean. Such "investments" will not help Sri Lanka to settle its current debt of around 100 billion dollars to any extent. Therefore, there is no logical or economic reason to implement such a potentially harmful policy for a comparatively minute return, unless there are unseen benefits to unseen groups.
- We are of the view that, "secure" plantations of any sort are practically impossible to operate in the context of Sri Lanka. Currently the enforcement agencies seem unable to address even the widespread availability and use of cannabis and other illegal drugs in in the country. We seriously doubt that the so-called "investors", enforcement agencies or the politicians that backed this process will take responsibility when such plantations contribute to increased availability of cannabis in the streets of Sri Lanka.
- Despite claims of medical benefits, there are many health harms of cannabis including mental disorders such as depression and schizophrenia, cannabis use disorders and serious lung ailments. It also affects brain development of adolescents and is associated with self-harm and suicide as well as road traffic accidents, that already are major killers in Sri Lanka.
- The tobacco and alcohol industries too have invested billions of dollars in cannabis multinationals, which should be considered a clear indication where such promised "investments" are heading.

Therefore, we sincerely hope that you would not support the cannabis multinationals to expand their market and increase their profit, by allowing them to take this crucial step to unlock the door to further dismantling of laws and regulations that are protecting the people of this country. The process, which has been set in motion by your government will ultimately cause significant health and social harm and untold misery to the people of Sri Lanka which they do not deserve.

The Expert Committee on Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) conducted the inaugural session of its public seminar series on "Healthy Living: The Crucial Role of No Added Sugar Products Across All Life Stages" at the SLMA Auditorium on 20 August 2025.

#### The Burden of Sugar and Non-Communicable Diseases

Modern dietary patterns have significantly increased the consumption of **free sugars**—sugars added during food processing and preparation. This dietary trend poses a serious public health challenge, particularly in developing countries such as Sri Lanka, by contributing to the rising burden of NCDs including **obesity**, **type 2 diabetes mellitus**, **cardiovascular disease**, **certain cancers**, **and dental caries** (1).

Excess sugar intake is harmful at every stage of life:

- **Children:** Early exposure to sweetened foods fosters a preference for sugary flavors, increasing the risk of childhood obesity and dental decay.
- Adults: Reducing added sugars is central to preventing long-term complications such as type 2 diabetes, hypertension, and heart disease.
- Older adults (>65 years): Limiting sugar intake helps regulate blood glucose levels, supports metabolic health, and improves overall quality of life.

A recent study in the Colombo district (Mututanthri et al., 2022) revealed that 813 preschool children (aged 4–5 years) consumed an average of 57.9 g of free sugars daily (equivalent to  $\sim$ 14.5 teaspoons), representing 21.1% of their daily energy intake. Alarmingly, the World Health Organization (WHO) recommends limiting free sugar intake to <5% of daily energy—indicating that nearly all (96%) of these children exceeded the safe limit by a fourfold margin (2).



#### Yogurt as the First Step: The 'No Added Sugar Yogurt Project'

For the past six years, the SLMA Expert Committee on NCDs has advocated for reducing added sugars in foods through sustained dialogue with stakeholders across the state and private sectors.

Yogurt was selected as the first intervention for the following reasons:

- 1. **Early childhood feeding:** Yogurt is often introduced during infancy. Added sugars can promote a "sweet tooth," reinforcing unhealthy dietary preferences into adulthood.
- 2. **Common dietary choice:** Yogurt is widely consumed across all age groups as a snack, dessert, or comfort food, and can be paired with natural fruit instead of added sugar.
- Nutritional role in care: Yogurt is frequently included in diets for older adults, patients in terminal care, and those requiring palliative nutrition.

In Sri Lanka, a standard **80 g cup of plain yogurt** contains **4–5 g of naturally occurring lactose**, yet most commercially available products add **~8 g of sugar** on top of this natural content. This nearly doubles the sugar load per serving, making yogurt a significant contributor to excess sugar intake.

Through today's initiative, the SLMA officially launched the "No Added Sugar Yogurt Project" as part of its broader "No Added Sugar in Food" campaign. The project aims to engage manufacturers, policymakers, and healthcare professionals in promoting yogurt varieties without added sugar, thereby offering the public a healthier, more sustainable choice.

#### Call to Action

The SLMA Expert Committee on NCDs emphasizes that this initiative is not only about reformulating a single product, but about **reshaping the national food environment** to safeguard the health of future generations. By eliminating added sugars where they are unnecessary, Sri Lanka can make a significant step toward curbing the epidemic of NCDs.

### Funding Renal Services in Sri Lanka: Towards Sustainability and Equity

#### Background

Chronic kidney disease (CKD) is a pressing public health challenge in Sri Lanka. It affects an estimated 10% of the adult population, due to conventional risk factors like diabetes mellitus and hypertension as well chronic kidney disease of unknown origin (CKDu). The provision of renal replacement therapy (RRT)-including haemodialysis, peritoneal dialysis, and kidney transplantation-remains heavily dependent on public funding through the Ministry of Health, Sri Lanka.

Despite the commendable expansion of services over the past decade, the current funding model is under increasing strain. Escalating costs, regional disparities, and dependence on external donations for consumables undermine sustainability. Furthermore, inequities persist, particularly in rural and estate populations, where access to nephrology services is limited.

This concept note aims to initiate a structured policy dialogue on developing a sustainable and equitable funding model for renal services in Sri Lanka.

# Advocacy Brief – Urgent Attention Required

The need to ensure that health professionals have a safe place to work



This incident is probably the tip of the iceberg. Many incidents of sexual harassment in many forms go unreported unnoticed, create work stress and dissatisfaction, and affect the self-respect and health professional attitudes towards their service as being a valued

person providing a dignified, important service.

This incident has caused ripple effects of anger and mistrust between health authorities and health professionals, acts of service disruptions, and mixed reactions among the public, who expect uninterrupted service despite the severity of the horrific incident that occurred.

Let us analyze the potential causes and effects of this incident, or of an incident of sexual harassment.


The diagram indicates that many situations are implicated as causes. This incident's effects are likely to be immediate or long-lasting. Obviously, both need to be addressed.

If not addressed, they contribute to a vicious cycle where the public, no doubt, whilst wanting the service from a noble profession, also resents the people who deliver. There will be growing tension and dissatisfaction among health professionals.

The SLMA strongly advocates to the Ministry of Health and higher government that the following actions be taken, which are not merely corrective measures at the institution per se ( TH Anuradhapura) but serve as a case in point to establish a system for the safety and protection of health professionals in their workplaces.

## Immediate action

Avoid service disruption

- a. Assure all health professionals that workplace protection measures will be addressed within a defined period of time.
- b. SLMA will provide within one week a checklist to be adopted by all health institutions to assess and take action to ensure workplace protection
- c. Make use of available resources and mechanisms to protect the work setting and, in particular, the female doctors. (police posts can also do patrols, and the public should also know of such interventions in place)
- d. Establish hospital safety committees with administrations, consultants, medical officers and representation from other staff to overlook the safety of their hospitals.

# Intermediate action

- a. Recall and adopt the guideline to address Sexual harassment in the workplace, produced in 2016 by the SLMA, which the Ministry has already agreed to implement - this is noting that mechanisms in place to address will also have an effect on the prevention
- b. All health administrators must be updated on their responsibilities to ensure a safe environment for patients and health workers.
- c. Adopt a zero-tolerance policy for workplace harassment. This involves creating confidential complaint mechanisms and an inquiry system within each hospital. This is for both the healthcare workforce and patients.

# Long term action

- a. Health institutions should be assessed on different parameters (clinical care, providing responsive care, -and as much as past emphasis has been on the cleanliness and orderliness of the hospitals and the gardens, it is important to emphasize the quality and safety of the working environment).
- b. All staff can pursue continuous professional development in violence prevention, action and safeguarding, personal protection, and interpersonal relationships in work settings. Online training can be organized to enhance their understanding of reporting.
- c. Such a program can be included in other professional training through the NAITA and even for other professionals like Teachers, Service personnel, etc.

#### INTRODUCTION

"Sri Lanka has become one of the fastest aging countries in the world. Its share of the population over 60 years of age, which was 12% in 2014, has exceeded the average of all countries in the South-East Asian region. According to population projections, this proportion will reach 28.5% by 2050. With ageing as the major non-modifiable risk factor for dementia, an epidemic of dementia is a certainty in Sri Lanka" - The National Institute of Health's National Library of Medicine (NIH/NLM)-

An ageing population brings with it an increase in physical and mental impairments and a need for more and more assisted care domestically and in care institutions. The National Institutes of Health's National Library of Medicine (NIH/NLM) says that "according to an epidemiological study done on dementia in semi urban and sub-urban populations in Sri Lanka, the prevalence of dementia was found to be 4%. With the projected rise in the ageing population, this is bound to increase in the years to come. Despite having a well-established healthcare system in Sri Lanka almost in par with developed countries, it is not geared to handle medical and social issues of rapidly expanding elderly people and notably that of dementia patients.

As a rapidly ageing country, Sri Lanka needs to think ahead (if it is not already too late) about how to provide aged care, including for dementia afflicted persons. Currently, older individuals are accommodated within the general health system. However, it is important to note that aged care is not solely about medications and hospitalization; it requires a range of services for the long-term care of a growing frail older population. Many of these individuals may be living alone without family caregiver support and are unable to access the services they need.

According to the World Bank, 80.97% of Sri Lanka's population lived in rural areas in 2022. The rural sector is also home to four-fifths of the country's poor people, with almost half of them being small-scale farmers. Sri Lanka's urban population is relatively small, with only around 18% of the population living in urban areas. The International Fund of Agricultural Development (IFAD) states that although the rural population is large, there is a dearth of research on health and socioeconomic issues in this group.

Sri Lanka's model of primary health care, available free through a government health system with island wide availability, forms a sound basis for providing universal health coverage. However, this system is increasingly under pressure notably from the high burden of non-communicable diseases (NCDs), increasing elderly care needs and the growing out of pocket expenditure for chronic diseases. Whilst the government's commitment to maintaining universal health services of good quality for all continues, the need for change has been recognized. The government is exploring now how a rational model of care can best be instituted given limited resources.

The primary healthcare system in Sri Lanka has a community health service (focusing mainly on maternal and child health and on communicable diseases and adopting prevention and health promotion strategies, based on the health unit system. The health units have defined catchment areas that coincide with local government administrative units and currently number 341 areas. Also known as MOH areas, they are managed by a medical doctor, supported by public health field staff), and a curative service (consisting of 496 Divisional hospitals providing both hospitalization and ambulatory services and 474 Primary Medical Care units providing only ambulatory care which function with non-specialist medical doctors and other staff).

Sri Lanka has more than a basic infrastructure for its communicable diseases. The challenge now is increasing from non-communicable diseases (NCDs) and elderly care needs including such needs for persons with dementia. It is in this backdrop that some strategies for more effective and efficient financing for aged care in Sri Lanka are presented.




Figure 1: These details were extracted by the presentation made by Prof. W.I De Silva on SLMA Policy Forum 21st February 2025

High level challenges to focus on when considering strategies for financing aged care within the backdrop of population demographic changes, economic upheavals and transformations

The following are two key challenges to focus on.

### Challenges and Opportunities

Strategizing health & social support for the elderly

Sri Lanka must strategize health and social support for its aging population amid an economic downturn, high migration out of the country creating constraints on care for the elderly, declining fertility, and low savings among older people for health and social support.

#### Promotion of wellness & healthy aging

Focusing on a promotive aspect, we need to ensure that aging happens actively, with the full participation of people who want to take care of themselves and enjoy better health for longer. An adequate orientation on wellness and active aging promotion is necessary for this. A multi-sector approach is needed here.

In designing strategic options for financing aged care, it is well to remember that challenges also present opportunities. The reality of demographic changes within the context of global economic transformation offers dividends for the future even if some dividends were not realized in the past.

#### The two demographic dividends -

- The first was the growth in the youth population, which has just begun to decline ending in 2028- did we adequately make use of this? We mainly exported this youth for overseas employment and probably have lost an adult population that needs to support our older population.
- The second is that young elders can still contribute to the economy and development—we must not lose this dividend.

These two potential demographic related dividends can and should be pursued when considering strategies for financing aged care. The cultural and historical approaches and practices to aged care are bound to change in years to come and any futuristic approaches to aged care financing will have to consider opportunities that demographic changes themselves present.

#### Long term consideration- Promotion of fertility

To address the long-term challenges, the country may need to encourage fertility measures. It is important to identify the reasons behind reduced birth rates and to support fertility wherever possible through mechanisms such as treatment for subfertility.

#### Where will financing be needed? Goals and Objectives

#### Goal -Uplifting health and social support services for the elderly

OVERRIDING NOTE – Elderly care referred to here includes care for elders with physical, mental and psychological disabilities, including elders with Dementia, Parkinson's etc. Elderly care for such persons will require more specialized primary care interventions, and community and home care-based interventions all of which will require more specialized doctors, nurses, caregivers and also programs to increase awareness within communities.

#### Objective 1 - Expansion of services to the elderly through primary health care Strategies

- As part of the primary care reforms, expanding a standard package of care for the long-term care needs of the elderly through Primary care.
- Further expansion of outreach nursing care, which was initiated in 2018, with the provision of transport facilities and communication and digital devices to ensure records and continuity of care across care levels
- c. Increasing female participation in employment as Sri Lanka ranks relatively low compared to other countries regarding the doctor-to-nurse ratio. Deploying more nurses to primary care institutions (approximately 1,000) for outreach community care.
- d. Providing more part-time positions for nurses at primary care hospitals closer to home (This is to make sure the benefits of qualified and trained nurses who have left the workforce to care for their families are not lost to the system of aged care)

#### Objective 2 - Enhancing community-based elderly care Strategies

- a. Training of community cadres for caregiving for elders there is an added impetus in supporting the economy around caregiving that will yield dividends as there will be more employment opportunities within the community and more economic activity consequently.
- b. Reorientation of health professionals and medical undergraduate training toward personcentered care as community care requires diverse skills and a solid understanding of social determinants. Note- Current undergraduate training for health professionals is not oriented towards caring in community or home settings but rather focuses on waiting for patients to arrive at facilities.
- c. Increasing financial support from the government and through partnerships with nongovernment entities for community models for caring for frail elders without family support because of migration and smaller family sizes and as as older individuals' savings may not be adequate for their care.
- d. Introducing residential and non-residential care centers with staff skilled in providing the level of services needed for the elderly. This infrastructure requirement along with ensuring the necessary skilled staff will be a major expenditure related to elderly care.
- e. Introducing transport and logistics requirements that are required by the elderly. These requirements will have to be taken note of people with physical and mental disabilities. This infrastructure cost will be substantial too.

#### Objective 3 - Mechanisms to look after left-behind elders due to the migration of their younger carers Strategies

- a. Allocating a component of inward migration remittances to care for the left-behind elderly. Note- While several models could possibly be considered, a national policy in this regard will have to be developed which could include an insurance scheme to cover elderly people in the category mentioned above.
- b. Considering introducing a mechanism for Sri Lankan migrant youth earnings from overseas employment to be invested in a high-quality elderly care fund.

#### Goal- Improving the efficiency of care and support for elders.

Objective 1- Greater coordination amongst relevant officials at all levels of administration to facilitate a more efficient and effective care and support service for elders.

#### Strategies

- a. Advocating greater coordination among these official's social support officer, an officer from the elders' secretariat, and the economic development officer assigning specific days for the social service officer to connect with the primary care hospital.
- b. Assigning specific days for the social service officer to connect with the primary care hospital and act as a link between elderly people and the primary care hospital service.
- c. Initiating regular meetings between several cadres employed across different sectors that can provide social
- d. Encouraging philanthropic and other civil society entities engagement in primary care to improve services specially for the most needed individuals requiring support such as assistive devices, lenses for cataracts, and more.

#### Goal - Promotion of wellness and healthy ageing

Objective — A multi-faceted approach involving all relevant stakeholders including the State, the private sector, NGOs, individuals, the media (including social media) that promotes wellness and healthy ageing as a cultural norm.

#### Strategies

- a. Incentivizing wellbeing Exploring an efficiency gain through incentivizing wellness as a dividend based on the preservation of wellness for a longer time. The economic gains for all stakeholders in people being healthy and well to be the basis for a model that rewards wellness.
- b. Promoting healthy living and wellness through investments in schools from preschool onwards and in wellness-related industries.
- c. Increasing emphasis and introducing a policy framework to prevent loneliness and fostering networking through group activities in communities, in religious institutions, volunteer home visits and through other supportive means. The current commendable policy of establishing day care centers should be broad based throughout the country over time and existing built space that is underutilized and accessible to be better utilized.

Goal — An inclusive, country wide elderly care system that looks after the elderly in the country with respect, love and kindness

Objective — Development of a fully costed strategic plan with short-, medium- and long-term deliverables to achieve the above goal.

#### Strategies

- a. Incorporate all strategies noted under different goals and objectives in a Master Plan for Elderly Care in Sri Lanka. The initial plan could be a ten-year plan.
- b. Organize a meeting/s with all relevant stakeholders to discuss the plan and obtain their input and suggestions. These meetings should include representatives from all political parties, provinces, districts, local government and other relevant administrative structures.
- c. A draft to be prepared incorporating input from stakeholders and estimated costs of strategies (interventions) included in the Master Plan. The plan should indicate the primary ownership of each strategy and the source of funding for each strategy.
- d. Each strategy in the Master Plan to be classified as short term, medium term or long term, with deliverables noted against each as per the classification by each year in the ten-year Master Plan.
- e. The draft Master Plan to be circulated to all attendees of meetings noted under strategy (b) with a time frame of two weeks to submit their final comments.
- f. A high-level health and social service ministry committee to consider the final comments and suggestions and finalize the Master Plan.
- g. The final 10 year Master Plan for Elderly Care in Sri Lanka to be presented to the cabinet of ministers within three months of the commencement of activities as per strategy (a).
- h. The cabinet approved Master Plan to be the basis for policy on elderly care in Sri Lanka.
- The high-level committee noted under strategy (f) will undertake an yearly review of the plan and its deliverables and make necessary amendments in regard to deliverables and submit them to the Minister for Health for approval.

#### Conclusions

- 1. Health and social support cannot be delinked further
- Financial implications would be for various interventions through the health and non-health sectors and the private sector.
- A common national strategic plan is necessary, should be widely shared, and requires the highest level of attention for implementation.
- Preserving wellness should be prioritized, and possible ways of incentivizing can be useful as people should feel that they are contributing towards wellbeing in older age.
- Health professional training must be person-centered; a transformation in health professional training requires broader discussion.
- 6. The care economy and female participation in the workforce need to be discussed further.
- 7. The care economy needs to be supported so that carers can also gain financially while in Sri Lanka.
- 8. There is an urgent need for a community model of social support to care for older persons.
- The government should consider policy options favouring 'young old' people to contribute to the economy
   Considering the negative effects of migration, ways of converting them to useful gain should be explored.
- For example, outbound migrants could contribute to an aged care fund for themselves and for older persons caring for their families left behind, and the Medical diaspora could be attracted to give back to the health system, creating a fund for aged care.
- 11. Policies that address the fertility decline and subfertility need to be considered.



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
